# Oregon Senators Tell Trump to Stay Out of Coos Bay LNG

(The Oregonian; May 3) - In response to recent comments made by National Economic Council director, Gary Cohn, Oregon Senators Ron Wyden and Jeff Merkley sent a strongly worded letter to the White House asking President Trump to stay out of the Jordan Cove LNG export terminal permitting decision. Mr. Cohn said permitting the Jordan Cove LNG export terminal is a priority of the Trump Administration. Sens. Wyden and Merkley responded, however, the regulatory review and permitting process should continue without interference from the White House. Read more

## New Ships Needed for Expected LNG Demand

(LNG World Shipping; May 3) - Due to increases in worldwide demand for LNG, Chief executive of French containment systems company, GTT, Philippe Berterottière, expressed concern that an insufficient number of ships are being built. Mr. Berterottière said, "There is additional demand for ships to deliver cargoes from LNG-export projects that have already been sanctioned - ships that have not yet been ordered." Read More

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
